



OWASA INVESTS IN AUTOMATED WATER METER TECHNOLOGY

In 2007, OWASA will begin to install new meters that transmit water use information by low-power radio to our meter readers.

The new meters, which are battery-powered, can be “read” with special equipment from several hundred feet away. When fully in place, the “radio-read” units will help us read meters more quickly and efficiently for about 20,000 customer locations in our community. Future personnel and energy costs will be lower than with traditional meter reading.

To date, OWASA has bought 2,000 of the new meters at a price of \$110 each. A conventional water meter costs about \$35. Initially, the new meters will be used where access is limited or meters are farther apart than normal.

We plan to buy and install about 1,000 of the new meters annually. Spreading out the purchases will lessen the annual budget impact of acquisition and installation costs.

“Radio-read meters are proven technology and a sound investment that will bring annual cost savings,” said John Greene, OWASA’s General Manager of Operations.
